1. **Description of fiscal impact:** HB 495 requires the Department of Fish, Wildlife & Parks to post a bond for each bison that is sold or transferred by the department to insure payment of potential damage the bison may cause. There are currently no bison transplants in progress or anticipated in the near future.

FISCAL ANALYSIS

Assumptions:

- 2. No transfers are currently planned through FY 2019.
- 3. However, if a bison transfer were to occur, FWP assumes a minimum of 10 and a maximum of 60 bison would be involved. Each \$5,000 bond would require a \$500 premium.
 - a. 10 bison bonds at \$500 each would total \$5,000.
 - b. 60 bison bonds at \$500 each would total \$30,000.
- 4. Hunting and fishing license dollars cannot be used for compensation costs associated with damage caused by wild buffalo or bison. Doing so would constitute a diversion of license revenue as defined by the US Fish & Wildlife Service (USFWS) (MCA 87-1-708 and 50 CFR80.11), making FWP ineligible to receive future funding from USFWS grant programs. It is assumed that the Fish and Wildlife Service would revoke FWP funding for all PR/DJ revenue if license dollars are spent for purposes of this bill. In FY 2015, the
